Legislative Update

As the Sentinel goes to press this month there is very little new to report on the legislative scene, so maybe it is time for a little reflection.. At both the state and federal levels, the various legislative committees that deal with authorizations (what can be done) and appropriations (the money to pay for it) are hard at work at various stages of progress in hammering out the details of the various bills. Once the various committees and subcommittees finish their work, the house and senate vote. There is never agreement between the two, so another committee is charged with working out the differences. Then the bills must pass muster with either the Governor or the President as the case might be.

This year there are actions on going at both the state and federal level that will ultimately affect us all. At the state level the key issue is authorization and funding for the many veterans' initiatives that came out of the Veterans' Task Force from last year. The Arizona Department of Veteran's Affairs and the Unified Arizona Veterans (UAV) called for help from state veterans organizations at key times during the year to provide grass roots support for these initiatives. The response from the veteran community has been outstanding. While the budget battles continue in Phoenix, we have reason to believe that our effort will be successful in getting these initiatives passed and signed into law.

At the national level, the key MOAA initiatives revolve around heading off substantial increases proposed by DOD for certain TRICARE and pharmacy fees and co-pays and in fixing remaining inequities in the Survivor Benefit Program (SBP). Again, responses to calls for action from MOAA and other veterans

groups have been outstanding. How it all falls together is still a work in progress, but at least the proposed increases in fees and co-pays appear to be a dead issue for this year with some constructive alternative action being seriously discussed.

I think that the message we should all be seeing here is that our collective efforts really matter. It may be a pain in your side to send emails when asked or tear out post cards and mail them in when asked, but these are really important things to do. We are small individually, but very large collectively. In any big operations, including government, finding enough resources (in this case money) to meet all the requirements (needs) is always a real challenge. Our elected representatives will always need to be reminded that we represent a significant part of their constituencies and that our concerns deserve high priorities.

For years many auxiliary members have viewed themselves as nonparticipating partners in their chapters. Too often they have shied away from taking leadership roles, leaving this to others. To a certain extent, chapters have been complicit in this situation. We would like to see this change!

When given an opportunity, auxiliary members can and do contribute much to their chapters and to MOAA. To illustrate: Where chapter bylaws permit, auxiliary members are frequently elected to leadership roles, and in some instances they have even been chosen as chapter and council presidents. The skills they have acquired over their lifetimes translate easily to chapter activities.

Consider this: When you belonged to and were active in various officer spouses clubs or other organizations, you likely served on different committees, helped organize events, raised funds for charities, ran meetings, helped write a newsletter, or participated in other ways. In short, auxiliary members have the skills to do what it takes. They have great organizational skills and know how to get things done! There is simply no question that auxiliary members can make a difference in chapters from coast to coast.

If you — an auxiliary — want to become more involved (and we hope you do), we suggest you check your chapter bylaws to see if they allow auxiliary members to hold office. If they do, RUN! If they don't, you might suggest that the bylaws be changed. In addition, you could consider asking to be appointed to a chapter committee. Various committees such as programs, events, personal affairs, publicity, or legislative would be interesting and challenging.
